Successful Recital Series 2015

Ten recitals and eleven performers demonstrated a variety of organ literature at this year's recital series at Christ the King and Bethlehem Lutheran Churches in Mankato. Recitals audiences ranged from 58-110 with both young and elderly present. The chapter received donations totaling roughly \$500. These recitals continue to be an important endeavor of the Sioux Trails Chapter.

Regional Convention 2015: St. Louis, MO from Chad Winterfeldt

As I muse this August afternoon upon the heavy rainfall here in the beautiful Minnesota River valley, I am reminded of another wet and rainy time in another river valley this past June. That memory is of the North Central Region AGO Convention in Saint Louis, June 22 - 24. While the rain didn't fall every hour of the convention, enough had fallen in the days preceding and after to make travel to and from Saint Louis tricky! Bridges were out, detours were made, and yet, the events of the convention made all travel accommodations worth the effort.

Foremost in my experience of any convention is the opportunity to hear great recitalists on fantastic instruments. In Saint Louis, I was able to hear fine recitals by Chris Marks, Daryl Robinson, Thomas Murray, and Barbara Raedeke. In each case, repertoire and instrument were matched fantastically, with my favorite being the new Juget-Sinclair organ at St. Mark's Episcopal, as performed upon by Dr. Raedeke. I highly recommend her new recording *Confluences* on the Raven label. On that recording, she



showcases the 20-stop tracker St. Mark's, which is wonderful in its ability to convey stylistically and musically pieces from many time periods.

Of course, a convention offers many sessions and workshops that accommodate the broad diversity of interests of church musicians these days. I attended several, and as an example of the spectrum of topics, my two favorites were "Jazz in Worship" and "Lydian Fourths, Flattened Thirds, and a Tuba - The Music of Herbert Howells." Handbells, Children's Choirs, and theater organs were also featured in concert or in workshop.

The urban setting of this regional and the plethora of instruments available made this particular convention seem almost like a national gathering. I enjoyed conversations with friends old and new, and was pleased to enjoy sessions and meals with two Gustavus organists – David Lim and Emily Rudquist. Also along for the ride was my family, which meant some opportunities for adventure as well. Top spots were the Arch and the City Museum. All in all, the trip to Saint Louis was a refreshing time, both professionally and personally.

Recap: Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza from David Lim

On Saturday, March 14, the STAGO hosted a Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza workshop, with 15 area student musicians in attendance. All gathered in Christ Chapel on the campus of Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, eager to start exploring.

Following some introductions and comments about the day, and a trek up the balcony stair, Dr. Chad Winterfeldt began to demonstrate and explain how the pipe organ functions from the console with a group surrounding the console. Gustavus student, Tony Ouradnik, performed Bach's familiar Toccata and Fugue in D minor, BWV565. Students had the opportunity to play and explore the chapel organ, visiting the blower room, pipe chambers – all up close and personal. The workshop then moved Gustavus' organ studio to visit the mechanical action Noack organ. The mechanics of the organ were explained in further detail with the help of demonstration models. Different methods of pipe construction were also explored, exposing some of the colour possibilities that the organ affords. Students watched the 'mess' of trackers, squares, and roller boards dance whilst others played the Noack instrument.

The workshop then moved to First Lutheran Church for a pizza lunch, which was quickly eaten. Dr. David Fienen explained the Hendrickson organs visual appearance and some history of organ construction and layout. Before climbing the balcony stairs, the Horizontal Trumpet was demonstrated. Students were again able to play the organ. with some assistance from Gustavus organ students, who had them try playing pedals and on different manuals. Students were also exposed to some organ literature through various videos and recordings.



The workshop was well received by many – students, parents/guardians, and presenters a like! Many words of appreciation and encouragement were exchanged. Several people In the months since, a few inquiries about organ lessons have come in. Workshops such as this Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza are an important endeavor of the Guild to introduce young musicians to the organ. Many thanks to all for supporting this task!

Kalevi Kiviniemi in Concert at Gustavus

World renowned Finnish organist Kalevi Kiviniemi will present a concert on Friday, October 16, at 7:30 p.m. in Christ Chapel on the campus of Gustavus Adolphus College. He will be joined by Jukka Pietilä, baritone for a program sponsored by the Gustavus Artist Series and the Finlandia Foundation of Minnesota.

Kiviniemi is perhaps better known in Europe than in the U.S., but a quick perusal of his performances on Youtube shows him to be performer of amazing skill. In particular, his improvisations are masterful, and incorporate many styles and resources. Expect the unexpected!

Kiviniemi has performed internationally, with concerts at Notre Dame in Paris, at the Lahti Organ Festival in Finland, and with major orchestras, including the Moscow Symphony Orchestra. His discography numbers over 140 recordings.

Pietilä is the Cantor of the Cathedral in Turku, Finland, and frequently performs music of Finnish composers with Kiviniemi.
