

Sioux Trails AGO Events Planned for Winter & Spring 2013

A presentation will be held regarding musicians' injuries by staff from the Sister Kenny Rehabilitation Institute at Abbot Northwestern Hospital, Minneapolis. This presentation will provide information about common injuries that musicians encounter, along with possible causes, types of treatment, and ways of prevention. This event will take place at Gustavus Adolphus College sometime in February. A firm date and time have not yet been determined. Presenters have spent a significant period of their career working with musicians, especially from the Minnesota Orchestra, The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, Saint Olaf College, Carleton College, and other notable institutions.

Other planned events include a student and member recital in April. An organ crawl to either Hutchinson or Sleepy Eye and spring business meeting are planned for later in the spring; a social gathering will be held prior to the business meeting. Dates and times for all these events have yet to be finalized. Check the chapter website in future months for updates regarding dates and times.

A Retrospect of Events from Spring & Summer 2012

This summer, our chapter proudly presented its annual Summer Noontime Recital Series in Mankato, each Tuesday of the summer months, beginning June 12 and ending August 21. The recitals occurred in two locations in downtown Mankato: five weeks at Grace Lutheran Church, 320 East Main Street and six weeks at Bethlehem Lutheran Church, 720 South Second Street. Each recital featured a member or friend of the chapter performing a varied recital lasting approximately 35 to 45 minutes. All programs were free and open to all.

We invited two guest performers from the Twin Cities and Collegeville, respectively. Our first guest performer, Dr. Kristina Langlois, professor of organ at Concordia University, St. Paul, opened the series on the Hendrickson at Grace Lutheran; our second guest performer, Br. Theophane (Kraig) Windschitl, St. John's Abbey, Collegeville, introduced our audiences to the Holtkamp at Bethlehem. All other recitals were played by chapter members. Attendance for the recitals varied from 52 persons to 156 persons, with an average attendance of about 75.

Perhaps the most enthusiastically received recital was the Patriotic Potpourri recital, presented on July 3. In addition to virtuosic compositions, several patriotic songs were sung, such as *America the Beautiful and My Country 'Tis of Thee.* This rousing secular opportunity to showcase the organ as a means for leading participatory song was particularly gratifying for the performers and also greatly appreciated by the audience members.

We were grateful for the generous support of the Prairie Lakes Regional Arts Council, who provided a grant for us to enhance our publicity efforts. In addition, we received a generous amount of dollars from the free-will donation accepted at each recital. Our summer series continues to be a very successful activity for our chapter; as we plan for another summer we should strive to envision new means to attract audiences to these wonderful recitals.
